Founder's Message



John 1:1 states, "In the beginning was the Word, the Word was with God, and the Word was God." Here, by referring to the Word, John actually refers to our

Lord and savior, Jesus Christ. But how can this be? Didn't we learn that Jesus was born of the Holy Spirit to a virgin called Mary (Mark 1:18 Luke 2:1), which was only over 2 millennia ago? So, how then can Jesus be present 'in the beginning'? Jesus wasn't even mentioned in the book of Genesis, was he?

Let us look at the gospel of John carefully. Well, when the apostle, John, said that the Word was God, he quite simply meant that God and Jesus are indeed one. In fact, along with the Holy Spirit, they form one body, one unit, one Holy Trinity. Therefore, in Gen 1:2-3, when God spoke into existence 'light', Jesus being that very light as in John 8:12 9:5, 12:35, 12:45, was ever


Living in the Light of the Resurrection

This month we honor Saint Bernadette Soubirous, a humble young girl from Lourdes, France, is a powerful example of faith and

perseverance. Born in 1844 to a poor family, she experienced eighteen Marian apparitions at the grotto of Massabielle in 1858, now Lourdes.

Despite skepticism and opposition and ridicule she remained steadfast in her testimony, sharing the Blessed Mother's message of prayer, penance, and trust in God. Her obedience and courage continue to inspire Catholics worldwide, especially the youth seeking to deepen their faith. After the apparitions, Bernadette entered religious life as a Sister of Charity in Nevers, where she embraced a hidden life of suffering and service. Battling illness, she offered her pain as a sacrifice, living out the Blessed Mother's call to holiness. She never sought recognition, focusing instead on humility and love for Christ. Her life reminds young people throughout the word that sainthood is not about status but about a heart fully given to God, even in suffering.

Today, Saint Bernadette's legacy lives on through the miraculous waters of Lourdes and the countless conversions inspired by her witness. Her incorrupt body remains a sign of God's grace, and her simple yet profound faith serves as a model for all who strive to follow Christ. As young adults, we are called to the same trust and devotion, knowing that, like Bernadette, God can work wonders through our faithfulness.

Our Ambassadors have been to Lourdes and Nevers, where her incorrupt body remains. Here is a picture of this quiet and humble saint.




